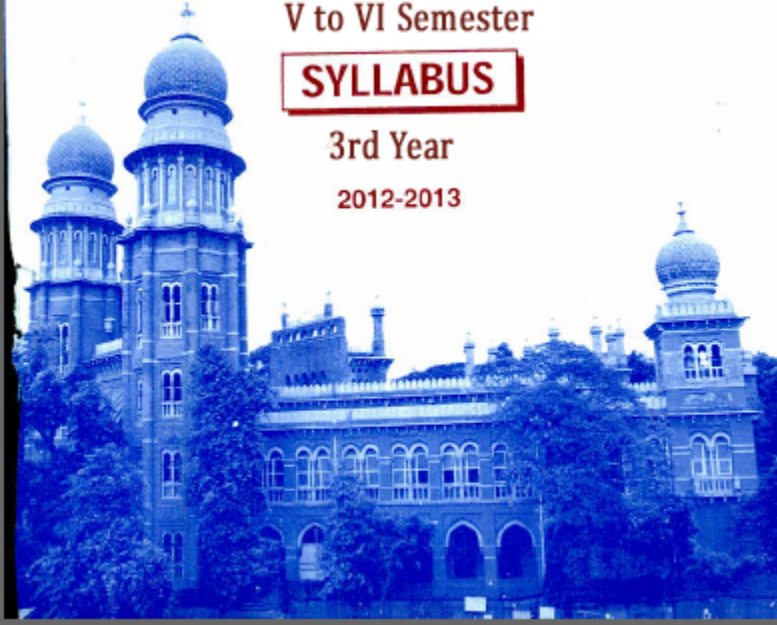

The Student must attend atleast two guest Lectures arranged by the college wherein Hon'ble Judges, Learned members of the Bar and part time Lecturers will deliver Lectures on the topics Professional Ethics, Bar Bench Relations and Contempt Law and Practice. The students must prepare a record on the various aspects discussed in the guest Lectures or any assignments given by the respective supervising teaching staff. The record book must be submitted to the library after obtaining signature from the respective Supervising Staff within the date specified.
